



Moved away from the pew to the platform.


Became technical beyond nonprofessionals' abilities.






Metrical Psalmody

- Reworks the words of Scriptures into poetic structure with meter and rhyme.
- One of the preferred forms of church singing during and after the Reformation.

Martin Luther



- Kept much of the Catholic liturgy when it did not contradict Scripture.
- Encouraged congregational singing in their own language.
- Promoted the use of new hymns and wrote many.
- Approved use of instruments.

Ulrich Zwingli



 Eliminated music from his services because he saw no command in Scripture to have it.

John Calvin



- Took positions less on tradition and more on Scriptures.
 - "Regulative Principle"
- Took a more moderate approach to music.
- Promoted the use of Psalms above Hymns.
- No instruments in worship.

1565 Genevan Psalter

 The tune at the top of the page is one of the most enduring legacies of this songbook. It is believed to have been written by Louis Bourgeois and is here associated with Psalm 134. Eventually it became associated with Psalm 100 and is now known as OLD HUNDREDTH.






Sternhold and Hopkins Psalter - 1562
